From the President

Welcome to Fall and Halloween around the corner. The recent fall season temperatures are a welcome relief to the Labor Day Weekend heat wave! What is it about Pleasanton Games weekend and heat? Sunday's high was 106° , followed by five straight days of triple digit temperatures. Even the day of our Pub Night the temperature topped out at 104° .




Queen Elizabeth II and Scotland - thoughts from Steve

I was among the many in the United Kingdom and around the world saddened by the loss of Her Majesty the Queen in September. Not only the longest reigning British monarch, Queen Elizabeth's 70 years on the throne made history as the world's second longest serving monarch. Being just four years old (slightly older than Charles) when Elizabeth ascended the throne, I've essentially only known Queen Elizabeth as the British monarch. Of course I learned much about her father King George VI over the years. And, of course, Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother. I also became ever more aware of the interrelatedness Queen Elizabeth had with Scotland. Herewith some musings in that regard with some connections in and around Blairgowrie and my visits to Scotland.

Queen Elizabeth was tied to Scotland by ancestry, having descended from the Royal House of Stewart. King George VI descended directly from James VI of Scotland, and Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother's family from the Bowes-Lyons, Earls of Strathmore. The Queen Mother was born in 1900 to Claude Bowes-Lyon, 14th Earl of Strathmore and Kinghorne and Cecilia Cavendish-Bentinck. Glamis Castle, the Earl's ancestral home in Scotland, was the childhood home of The Queen Mother.

Glamis Castle is located 40 miles southeast of Blairgowrie in the village of Glamis, in Angus. Queen Elizabeth's sister HRH Princess Margaret, Countess of Snowden was born at Glamis Castle. Elizabeth and Margaret enjoyed childhood times at Glamis where their love of horses were nurtured. During our 2008 trip to Blairgowrie, we visited Glamis Castle, touring the house and grounds. At the corner of the Italian Garden is a memorial to Princess Margaret.

The Royal Family has stayed at Balmoral in the highlands since 1848 when Prince Albert acquired a

Queen Elizabeth spent annual summer holidays at Balmoral and in residence when the annual Braemar Games were held. The royal family traditionally attends the Braemar Games which are held on the first Saturday in September — that day is known as **Braemar Day** in Blairgowrie. The city celebrates with a program of events including a massed pipe bands parade, performances by local dancers, singers, and bands, market stalls for local crafters, producers, community groups/organizations and food vendors. It culminates in a fireworks display over the River Ericht and a Family Ceilidh in the Angus Hotel. I, along with several members of PBFSCO, had the honor to represent Pleasanton as participants in the 2008 Braemar Day opening ceremony. On Sunday, we were again honored to represent Pleasanton at the Blairgowrie Highland Games.

Queen Elizabeth II and Scotland - thoughts from Steve

On our most recent trip to Scotland in August, we made a return visit to Holyroodhouse in Edinburgh where Queen Elizabeth typically spent one week each summer carrying out official engagements and ceremonies. As she was not in residence in August, we toured several interior rooms. Little did we know that a few short weeks later Elizabeth's coffin would travel up the Royal Mile in a procession from Holyroodhouse to St. Giles Cathedral. A journey we made on our first visit to Edinburgh in 2000, on a second visit in 2008 and once again last summer. Recalling those walks made viewing of the live televised procession up the Royal Mile all the more moving.



I asked Laurence how Queen Elizabeth's death affected him and Blairgowrie. "The loss of the Queen, although not entirely unexpected at her advanced age, was an occasion of national mourning here as you will have inferred from the broadcasts, with great emphasis on her devotion to duty and steadfast service. The fact that this happened in Scotland rather than in London provided an opportunity to experience the journey of the coffin on it's way to Edinburgh at close quarters and daughter-in-law Gill was part of the crowd in

I anticipate that the Royal Family's bond and connection with Scotland carries on through the reign of King Charles III. I think about the numerous times over the past that I observed King Charles wearing his kilt in public. I like to think that won't change in the future. And I would also expect that Balmoral continues to be a coveted Scottish residence for the Royal Family. It does belong to the family as ownership has passed to succeeding royals and now rests with Charles. Probably the most indelible image regarding Balmoral that will stick with me is the last public photo of Queen Elizabeth with Liz Truss only two days before her death.

Dundee as it passed by." And he said that Blairgowrie like other parts of Britain "...marked the occasion with shop and facility closures, flags at half mast, church openings and so forth."
